

Welcome to our first sermon series booklet for 2024.

At St Matts, we exist to be a community of lifelong disciples of Jesus engaging our world with grace and truth. A key part of this growth happens as we engage with the word of God. Taking time to reflect on the word of God as it's preached, meeting with others to study the word of God more deeply and taking time to engage personally with the word of God devotionally are all God's gracious provision for our flourishing.

Our theme for 2024 is "BOLD". We have just spent some time together thinking about what it means to be bold. We also acknowledge that being bold for Jesus in our day and age is not easy. Our series in 2 Timothy aims to remind us that while we may face opposition and hardship because of what we believe, God has given us his Spirit of power, and the gospel of Jesus is a message that's worth sharing. We trust that God uses his word and the encouragement of his people (your community group) to increase our boldness for him, that he might be honoured as people come to know the Lord Jesus.

If you are new to these booklets, the booklet provides you with 4 key things that will help you get the most out of 2 Timothy.

- 1. Each week you have the text of the sermon for you to read, markup and consider questions and challenges it presents before the Sunday it is preached upon. For copyright reasons we will now publish the Berean Standard Bible (BSB). It's very close in translation to the NIV, which we use to preach. You will notice some differences. Often it can be helpful to engage with more than one translation to gain a fuller sense of meaning in the original language. We trust you will find it helpful rather than distracting.
- 2. The blank page following the text is for sermon notes. Write down idea's, questions and key points that come out of the sermon. Creative doodling is fine too:)
- 3. Questions are provided for Community groups, should they wish. You may like to use resources such as bible.org to supplement your study
- 4. Finally, you will find a structure and space for four personal devotions each week.

  Use the blank space to engage with God's word however you'd like, with text or pictures or other creative endeavours. We encourage you to spend time in prayer for things that come up in your devotional time, as well as praying for other matters.

I look forward with confidence to seeing how God continues to grow us as lifelong disciples of Jesus, making us strong in Christ.

### 2 Timothy 1:1-18

<sup>1</sup> Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, according to the promise of life in Christ Jesus,

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

- <sup>3</sup> I thank God, whom I serve with a clear conscience as did my forefathers, as I constantly remember you night and day in my prayers. <sup>4</sup> Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy.
- <sup>5</sup> I am reminded of your sincere faith, which first dwelt in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice, and I am convinced is in you as well.
- <sup>6</sup> For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands. <sup>7</sup> For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power, love, and self-control.
- <sup>8</sup> So do not be ashamed of the testimony of our Lord, or of me, His prisoner. Instead, join me in suffering for the gospel by the power of God. <sup>9</sup> He has saved us and called us to a holy calling, not because of our works, but by His own purpose and by the grace He granted us in Christ Jesus before time began. <sup>10</sup> And now He has revealed this grace through the appearing of our Savior, Christ Jesus, who has abolished death and illuminated the way to life and immortality through the gospel, <sup>11</sup> to which I was appointed as a preacher, an apostle, and a teacher.
- <sup>12</sup> For this reason, even though I suffer as I do, I am not ashamed; for I know whom I have believed, and I am convinced that He is able to guard what I have entrusted to Him for that day.
- <sup>13</sup> Hold on to the pattern of sound teaching you have heard from me, with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. <sup>14</sup> Guard the treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit who dwells in us.
- <sup>15</sup> You know that everyone in the Province of Asia has deserted me, including Phygelus and Hermogenes.
- <sup>16</sup> May the Lord grant mercy to the household of Onesiphorus, because he has often refreshed me and was unashamed of my chains. <sup>17</sup> Indeed, when he arrived in Rome, he searched diligently until he found me.

### **Bible Study: 2 Timothy 1:1-8**

Each of these Bible studies is written in different styles, to engage different people who learn in different ways. This first study uses the COMA method – Context, Observation, Meaning, Application.

#### Read 2 Timothy 1:1-18

1. CONTEXT: What do you know about the relationship between Paul and Timothy? (Hint: see Acts 16:1-5, Philippians 2:19-22)

#### **Reread verses 1-6**

- 2. OBSERVATION: Circle all the times that the words "remember," "recall" or "remind" come up in the passage. What things does Paul remember?
- 3. MEANING: What does this show is important to Paul?

#### **Reread verses 7-18**

- 4. OBSERVATIONS: What are the instructions that Paul gives to Timothy? (See 8, 13-14). What does this suggest about Timothy's circumstances?
- 5. Circle all the times the word "shame/ashamed," or "timid" come up.
- 6. What examples does Paul give of people who were ashamed of the gospel? What about examples of people not being ashamed?
- 7. MEANING: Why might we be ashamed of the gospel? Can you think of times when you felt timid or ashamed for being a Christian?

### 2 Timothy 2:1-13

<sup>1</sup> You therefore, my child, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus. <sup>2</sup> And the things that you have heard me say among many witnesses, entrust these to faithful people who will be qualified to teach others as well.

<sup>3</sup> Join me in suffering, like a good soldier of Christ Jesus. <sup>4</sup> A soldier refrains from entangling himself in civilian affairs, in order to please the one who enlisted him. <sup>5</sup> Likewise, a competitor does not receive the crown unless he competes according to the rules. <sup>6</sup> The hardworking farmer should be the first to partake of the crops. <sup>7</sup> Consider what I am saying, for the Lord will give you insight into all things.

<sup>8</sup> Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, descended from David, as proclaimed by my gospel, <sup>9</sup> for which I suffer to the extent of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God cannot be chained! <sup>10</sup> For this reason I endure all things for the sake of the elect, so that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory.

If we died with Him,
we will also live with Him;

12 if we endure,
we will also reign with Him;
if we deny Him,
He will also deny us;

13 if we are faithless,
He remains faithful,
for He cannot deny Himself.

- 1. What three instructions does Paul give to Timothy in verse 1-3?
- 2. Split into three groups, and each take one of the metaphors. Fill out the table below from verse 4-6.

### 2 Timothy 2:14-26

- <sup>14</sup> Remind the believers of these things, charging them before God to avoid quarreling over words, which succeeds only in leading the listeners to ruin.
- <sup>15</sup> Make every effort to present yourself approved to God, an unashamed worker who accurately handles the word of truth.
- <sup>16</sup> But avoid irreverent, empty chatter, which will only lead to more ungodliness, <sup>17</sup> and the talk of such people will spread like gangrene. Among them are Hymenaeus and Philetus, <sup>18</sup> who have deviated from the truth. They say that the resurrection has already occurred, and they undermine the faith of some.
- <sup>19</sup> Nevertheless, God's firm foundation stands, bearing this seal: "The Lord knows those who are His," and, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord must turn away from iniquity."
- <sup>20</sup> A large house contains not only vessels of gold and silver, but also of wood and clay. Some indeed are for honorable use, but others are for common use. <sup>21</sup> So if anyone cleanses himself of what is unfit, he will be a vessel for honor: sanctified, useful to the Master, and prepared for every good work.
- <sup>22</sup> Flee from youthful passions and pursue righteousness, faith, love, and peace, together with those who call on the Lord out of a pure heart.
- <sup>23</sup> But reject foolish and ignorant speculation, for you know that it breeds quarreling. <sup>24</sup> And a servant of the Lord must not be quarrelsome, but must be kind to everyone, able to teach, and forbearing. <sup>25</sup> He must gently reprove those who oppose him, in the hope that God may grant them repentance leading to a knowledge of the truth. <sup>26</sup> Then they will come to their senses and escape the snare of the devil, who has taken them captive to his will.

#### Pray and read 2 Timothy 2:14-26

- 1. Split into groups of 2-3. Use this passage to create a list of traits for:
  - a. A worker approved by God
  - b. A false teacher

- 2. What stood out to you from these two lists? Are there any groupings or patterns that you notice?
- 3. There are lots of instructions in this passage about how you speak. Why is the way you speak so important?
- 4. Verse 19 is a little summary of the gospel. What are the essential elements of the gospel in this verse?

- 5. The metaphor of bowls/articles seems like a change in gear, but it's not! How does this metaphor fit with the rest of the passage?
- 6. In verses 25-26, how does God want us to deal with people who might oppose our message? What does God want for them?

#### **Application**

It can be easy to assume that this passage only applies to people in "official" teaching roles in a church. However, *ALL* Christians are called to be God's workers (if you don't believe me – check out Ephesians 2:10).

- 7. How can you be working towards being an approved worker? What is one trait that would like to grow in?
- 8. Take a minute to reflect on your own: Is there sin in your life that you need to flee from? Who can you confess this sin to, and pray for you in this?
- 9. What will it look like for you to be bold this week? What is one BOLD practice and one person that you can be intentional with this week?

### 2 Timothy 3:1-17

<sup>1</sup> But understand this: In the last days terrible times will come. <sup>2</sup> For people will be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boastful, arrogant, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, <sup>3</sup> unloving, unforgiving, slanderous, without self-control, brutal, without love of good, <sup>4</sup> traitorous, reckless, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God, <sup>5</sup> having a form of godliness but denying its power. Turn away from such as these!

<sup>6</sup> They are the kind who worm their way into households and captivate vulnerable women who are weighed down with sins and led astray by various passions, <sup>7</sup> who are always learning but never able to come to a knowledge of the truth.

<sup>8</sup> Just as Jannes and Jambres opposed Moses, so also these people oppose the truth. They are depraved in mind and disqualified from the faith. <sup>9</sup> But they will not advance much further. For just like Jannes and Jambres, their folly will be plain to everyone.

<sup>10</sup> You, however, have observed my teaching, my conduct, my purpose, my faith, my patience, my love, my perseverance, <sup>11</sup> my persecutions, and the sufferings that came upon me in Antioch, Iconium, and Lystra. What persecutions I endured! Yet the Lord rescued me from all of them. <sup>12</sup> Indeed, all who desire to live godly lives in Christ Jesus will be persecuted, <sup>13</sup> while evil people and imposters go from bad to worse, deceiving and being deceived.

<sup>14</sup> But as for you, continue in the things you have learned and firmly believed, since you know from whom you have learned them. <sup>15</sup> From infancy you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. <sup>16</sup> All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for instruction, for conviction, for correction, and for training in righteousness, <sup>17</sup> so that the servant of God may be complete, fully equipped for every good work.

#### Bible Study: 2 Timothy 3:14-17

Instead of a study this week we're going to enjoy God's breathed-out word. Here are 3 suggested activities that you can do as a group – you can choose 1, or do all 3 if you like (each activity takes 20-30 minutes)

- 1. Each person share their favourite verse or passage, and why it is their favourite. Take the time to read the verse/passage slowly to "breathe" it in.
- 2. Discuss: why might memorising parts of scripture be a good practice? Now memorise 2 Timothy 3:14-17.
- 3. Meditate on a passage of scripture as a group. (Suggested passages to choose from: Ephesians 1: 1-14, Colossians 1:15-20, 1 Peter 1:3-9, Psalm 19)
  - Everyone close your eyes and focus on slowing down your breathing
  - Have one person read the passage out loud, slowly and clearly.
  - Sit in silence for 2 minutes, meditating on what you heard
  - Read out the passage again, pausing at the end of every sentence.
  - Sit in silence for another 2 minutes
  - Read the passage out again for a third time, at a normal pace.
  - Open your eyes, and each person share one thing that stood out to you from the passage.

#### 2 Timothy 4:1-8

<sup>1</sup> I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who will judge the living and the dead, and in view of His appearing and His kingdom: <sup>2</sup> Preach the word; be prepared in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and encourage with every form of patient instruction.

<sup>3</sup> For the time will come when people will not tolerate sound doctrine, but with itching ears they will gather around themselves teachers to suit their own desires. <sup>4</sup> So they will turn their ears away from the truth and turn aside to myths.

## Pray and Read 2 Timothy 4:1-8

1.	What instructions does Paul give to Timothy in this passage? (vs 2, 5). What does this show is important?
2.	What's the reason that Paul gives in verses 3-4?
3.	Can you think of any examples of people turning away from truth?
4.	When might we be tempted to turn away from the truth? Are there any parts of the Bible that we are tempted to down-play or ignore?
5.	How can we keep holding on to sound doctrine?
6.	Re-read Paul's words in verse 6-8. How might these 'last words' have been a comfort and encouragement to Timothy? How are they a comfort and encouragement to us?

(Optional Activity) Re-write this passage from the perspective of an older Christian mentor to you (this can be a real person or an imagined person). What might they say about their 'race'? What instructions and advice might they give to you?

Amen.
- <sup>19</sup> Greet Prisca and Aquila, as well as the household of Onesiphorus.
- <sup>20</sup> Erastus has remained at Corinth, and Trophimus I left sick in Miletus.
- <sup>21</sup> Make every effort to come to me before winter.

Eubulus sends you greetings, as do Pudens, Linus, Claudia, and all the brothers.
